
## The Glenview Budget: A Municipal Success Story

Glenview has a long history of sound fiscal management, cost containment and a focus on innovative business practices, and these qualities have helped the Village become the place it is today.

Every year, those same qualities serve as guidelines for Village staff and the Board of Trustees as they work through the Village's months-long budget process.

The Board approved Glenview's 2022 budget at its Dec. 7 meeting following a public hearing. The budget is the most important work product the Board must develop and approve every year. Not only is it a legal document detailing how dollars are spent, but it also lays out Village goals and objectives for the coming year.

In this article we'll take a closer look at how the budget is created, where tax dollars go and finally, some highlights of the approved 2022 budget.



### How is the budget made?

The process of preparing the budget begins in April each year with the development of a five-year forecast. Village staff use that forecast to develop each department's budget using a zero-based approach, meaning that rather than drawing from last year's budget, the Village starts from scratch to ensure a ground-up review of all expenditures on an annual basis.

The formal, public budget cycle kicks off in the fall through a series of three budget workshops in which the Board and the public review and discuss revenues, expenses and ongoing capital improvement projects. These workshops are open for public participation, providing residents and business owners the opportunity to ask questions and give feedback about spending priorities.

The Board then meets once in November to review the property tax levy, which is the amount of revenue a taxing jurisdiction needs to raise from property taxes. Then it meets once more in December to formally adopt the final budget. Both the levy review and final review of the budget are preceded by public hearings to allow for public participation.

Glenview's process for preparing the budget has served the Village well. The Village has maintained a balanced budget going back decades and has received a Aaa rating from Moody's for 31 years running – one of only 13 Illinois municipalities currently receiving this highest score. This credit rating allows the Village to take advantage of lower interest rates when financing is needed and is a testament to the Village's strong financial position.

### Where do tax dollars go?

The Village portion of your property tax bill makes up 6.8% of your overall tax bill, meaning less than seven cents of every dollar you pay in property taxes comes to the Village. The budget process helps ensure those seven cents get used in a fiscally responsible manner to maximize the benefit to the community.

The rest of your tax bill goes to other taxing jurisdictions, such as schools, the library, Glenview Park District and Cook County.

The Village of Glenview has one of the lowest tax rates among area municipalities and rarely raises its levy.

### What's in the 2022 budget?

Glenview has an \$81.1 million operating budget in 2022. More than half of those expenditures fund public safety for the community including the police department, fire department and public safety dispatch center, which fields 9-1-1 calls.

# Village Flashback

With the conclusion of The Glen Tax Increment Financing District (see page 3), redevelopment of the former Glenview Naval Air Station is symbolically complete.

Vestiges of the site's rich aviation history can still be found on some of the more than 1,100 acres – such as in Navy Park and Gallery Park. The specific evolution can be traced from documents and artifacts housed at the Glenview History Center.

Initially, some 430 acres – bounded by Willow Road, Shermer Road, Lake Avenue and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway tracks – were acquired from more than a dozen property owners by Curtiss-Wright Airports Corporation in 1929. It built a million-dollar commercial airport “of the highest department of commerce rating,” which became an important transportation hub and scene of aerial exhibitions and races.

The U.S. Navy – recognizing the Glenview parcel's potential – moved its airstrip there from the Reserve Aviation Base in Great Lakes in 1937, after it became inadequate for high-speed aircraft. The Navy petitioned for the airport's condemnation in 1940, and was ordered by a court a year later to pay \$42,000 for the property, which eventually expanded to 1.5 square miles.

In 1942, construction began on what was called Naval Reserve Aviation Base Glenview, then budgeted at \$12.5 million. Along with conducting primary flight training for Naval and Marine Corps aviators, the Navy also initiated a carrier qualification training program. Pilots trained aboard the converted carriers USS Wolverine and USS Sable on Lake Michigan.

During World War II nearly 9,000 aviation cadets received primary flight training in Glenview. Future presidents Gerald Ford and George H.W. Bush served there. After the war, the base was used for active duty Naval, Marine, Army and Air Force air reservists and the U.S. Coast Guard.

Glenview residents had an uneasy relationship with the base over the years – frustrated by the aircraft noise yet thrilled by the aerial shows. That ended in 1995, when the Navy decommissioned the base, and the Village began the process of tearing down its 110 buildings and 300 acres of runways and aprons.

## The Glenview Budget: A Municipal Success Story

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The other half of the expenses cover things like snow and ice maintenance, landscaping and forestry services, the Village's resolution center, records department and IT equipment and services.

Here are a few other highlights in the 2022 budget:

- \$29.8 million in capital improvement projects. Of this amount, \$16.5 million is budgeted for 3.73 miles of road reconstruction and 4.5 miles of water main replacements.
- No increase in the water consumption rate. Thanks to the addition of a large wholesale customer, the Village was able to pass those savings along to residents. Updated water and sewer rates can be found on the Village website.
- The conclusion of The Glen TIF. The Glen redevelopment, which started back in 1998, brought 5,500 new residents to Glenview, thousands of jobs and nearly two million square feet of retail, restaurant, hotel and office space. The conclusion of the TIF means the various taxing jurisdictions, including the Village, can begin directly receiving property tax payments that had previously been deposited into the TIF fund. And though the Village will be receiving a greater share of property tax dollars going forward, property owners will see no increase to their property tax bills as a result of the TIF ending.
- \$6 million in one-time federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act signed into law by President Biden in the spring of 2021. These funds will be used for road and streetscape updates; support for up to 100 local businesses impacted by the pandemic; inventory and replacement of lead service lines; and critical investment in much needed watermain replacement projects.



## From the Village President

On Nov. 16, 2021, the Glenview Village Board of Trustees voted unanimously and emphatically in favor of concluding The Glen TIF a year earlier than projected.

This was a monumental moment in the Village's nearly 123-year history and certainly something worthy of celebration.

Legally speaking, the conclusion of The Glen TIF district is merely a formality that enables area taxing districts to begin directly receiving property taxes generated from The Glen. Going forward, instead of property tax payments being made to the TIF fund, those same payments will go directly to taxing districts, including the Glenview Public Library, Glenview Park District, Village of Glenview and School Districts 30, 34 and 225.

But in a practical sense, the conclusion of the TIF marks the end of a historic, landmark redevelopment that brought 5,500 residents, thousands of new jobs and nearly 1.9 million square feet of retail, restaurant, hotel and office space to the Village of Glenview. The award-winning redevelopment of the Glenview Naval Air Station has become the model for how to close and redevelop decommissioned American military bases.

This was a 20-plus year project that ended ahead of schedule with all its obligations paid in full. It's a government success story and one that demonstrates how effective local governance and financial responsibility can be in positively impacting the lives of residents and business owners.

The Glen redevelopment has provided so much value to our community, including Gallery Park, Attea Middle School, Park Center, The Glen of North Glenview Metra Station, Fire Station 14, Kohl Children's Museum, the Northeastern Illinois Public Safety Training Academy and nearly 650 acres of private residential and commercial developments. Not to mention some 40% of the development's land area was reserved as open space for recreation and other amenities.

Glenview owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to the many members of the Board, Village staff and other civic leaders who have shepherded this massive project. And thank you to all the residents and business leaders who weighed in over the years with feedback about what The Glen should aspire to be.

## Give Your Tree a Green Goodbye

You don't have to throw your live Christmas tree in the trash. The tree is biodegradable, which means it can be easily reused or recycled for mulch. Trees can be dropped off until Jan. 31 at these designated collection points:

- Glenview Public Works, 2498 East Lake Avenue
- Johns Park, 2101 Central Road
- Flick Park, 3600 Glenview Road
- Cunliff Park, 540 Echo Lane
- Cole Park, 1031 Kenilworth Avenue
- Willow Park, 2600 Greenwood Avenue
- Gallery Park, 2001 Patriot Boulevard

Alternatively, residents in single-family homes or multi-family properties that have opted into the Village's refuse and recycling program can put trees, wreaths and garlands out with the regular garbage during the month of January. Groot will collect them at no additional charge. All ornaments, lights and tinsel should be removed from trees. Do NOT cover the tree with a plastic disposal bag. Multifamily dwellings that are not part of the Village's waste contract should refer to their management companies for the appropriate method of disposal. And remember, holiday lights can also be recycled! Drop them off in the marked receptacle outside the Public Works Service Center through Feb. 28.

## 2022 Commuter Parking Permits Offer Lower Cost, Greater Flexibility



The Village is making a few changes to 2022 Commuter Parking Permits to lower costs and increase flexibility for commuters. These changes are in response to the smaller pool of commuters using Village parking lots due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and rising popularity of remote work.

The Village is offering a temporary 25% discount from the pre-pandemic rate for the 2022 resident and non-resident annual, semi-annual and monthly permits. As a reminder: daily parking is still available at both stations by paying \$2 per day

at the pay box or on the PassPort Parking App.

To enhance commuter flexibility, the 2022 permits are interchangeable between the Downtown Glenview and Glen of North Glenview Train Stations. This change is being implemented based on customer feedback provided through the Village's recent commuter parking survey.

## Board of Trustees Approves Development Agreement for New Movie Theater at The Glen

The redevelopment of the movie theater marks an important first step for the Village's Economic Development Strategic Plan, which was adopted by the Board in August. The theater was identified as a "spark site" for potential redevelopment, and public feedback at multiple Glenview Connect meetings underscored the strong desire for a replacement theater operator.

"The Glenview Connect process was all about listening to the community regarding their vision for Glenview, and there was overwhelming support to keep a movie theater in The Glen Town Center," said Village President Mike Jenny. "The presence of a movie theater supports the vibrancy of the area, the nearby restaurants and the overall shopping center experience at The Glen."

The Glenview Board of Trustees voted in unanimous support of a development agreement for a new tenant at the existing movie theater at The Glen Town Center following public feedback stemming from the recently completed Glenview Connect process.

The new theater operator, Landmark Theatres, will feature first-run and art house films at the location formerly occupied by ArcLight Cinemas, which closed amid the COVID-19 pandemic in April.

Landmark Theatres, which also has locations in Highland Park and Chicago's Lincoln Park neighborhood, will be contributing funds to support the re-tenanting of the theater space, which includes updates to the theater's 20-year-old seating, projection equipment and sound systems. The owner of the space and Landmark intend to complete building improvements ahead of the summer blockbuster season in 2022.

## First Friday Recycling Returns in 2022

The Village will continue offering its First Friday Recycling program in 2022 to provide a safe way to dispose of medications and sharps.

The program runs from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. beginning Jan. 7, and will continue on the first Friday of each month in the Village Hall lobby at 2500 E. Lake Avenue. The other first Friday dates are Feb 4, March 4, April 1, May 6, June 3, July 1, Aug. 5, Sept. 2, Oct. 7, Nov. 4 and Dec. 2. When the weather warms up, the event will move outdoors to the Village Hall parking lot.

Prescription and over-the-counter drugs are accepted, as well as mercury-containing thermometers, wall switches and thermostats. American flags are also accepted for retirement. Leave medications in their original containers and mark out personal information. No controlled substances or over-the-counter liquid medications are accepted.

While a small amount of prescription drugs can be dropped off for safe disposal 24/7 at the Glenview Police Department, the First Friday program is a great opportunity to gather large amounts of recyclable material. Consider rounding up expired medications and sharps from your neighbors and throughout the community.



The Village is offering a 25% discount on permit fees for single-family home improvement projects, such as room additions, interior remodeling, detached garages, sheds, decks, driveways and swimming pools.

The fee discount is available for building permit applications filed between Dec. 1, 2021, and February 28, 2022. The discount does not apply to new single-family homes, multi-family or commercial projects, and applies only to plan review and permit fees – not pass-through charges such as engineering costs related to water service, water meter or utilities.

By submitting plans during the winter, when such activity is usually slower, permits can be issued faster and residents can avoid the delays that may occur during the busier spring and summer months. ## New Roundabout to Improve Intersection Safety and Operations

The Village of Glenview is implementing a roundabout at the intersection of Patriot Boulevard and the Costco Access Roadway to improve traffic operations and to make the conditions safer for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists.

Since the development opened, customers of the area businesses experience regular traffic delays exiting and entering the Costco, Costco Gas Station and Home Depot sites due to competing turning movements and high traffic volumes, particularly during peak hours of operations. The proposed intersection modifications will improve traffic operations and allow more vehicles to proceed on their way without needing to wait, improve safety and reduce vehicle emissions at this intersection, as well as make the conditions safer for pedestrians and cyclists.

A dedicated southbound right turn lane will also be added at this location to address existing traffic queuing during peak hours of business operations. Decorative colored concrete islands, street lighting and landscaping are also planned to enhance this business corridor within The Glen.

Construction staging will be implemented to minimize disruptions to businesses during construction, with an anticipated start in June 2022.

## Village seeks Landscaping Commissioner

The Village is looking for an interested, civic-minded landscaping professional for a volunteer appointment to the vacant commissioner position on the Village's Development Adjustments Commission.

The Commission meets twice per month – the first and third Wednesdays at 7 p.m. – to review site plan changes and signage, architecture, landscaping and lighting designs for existing commercial and multi-family developments and single-family zoning variation requests throughout the community. # Avoid the Risks for Winter Fires

December, January and February are the leading months for U.S. home fires. Cooking, heating, holiday decorations and candles all contribute to an increased risk of fire during the winter months.

To avoid the risk of starting a fire, never use a natural gas oven to heat your home – even for a short time. If you must use an electric heater, be sure not to overload the circuit. Do not use a heater in a bathroom or other areas where it may come in contact with water. Turn portable heaters off when you leave or go to sleep, and only use a properly rated extension cord.

Keep flammable items at least three feet from heating equipment like a furnace, fireplace, wood stove or portable space heater.

Carbon monoxide can become a problem due to poor performing appliances such as furnaces and space heaters. Carbon monoxide detectors are required within 15 feet of rooms used for sleeping in all residences to detect this colorless, odorless, tasteless gas.



# New Fire Engine, Ambulance Hitting Glenview Streets

Be on the lookout for a couple of new Village vehicles around town in 2022. The Glenview Fire Department has added a new fire engine and ambulance to its updated fleet.

The engine is an Arrow XT from Pierce Manufacturing that comes in at 10 feet tall with a 500-gallon tank for water. The ambulance is a 2021 Horton built by Foster Coach. It comes with a power load cot system for additional patient and operator safety.

# Help Your House Cope in Cold Weather

Water expands as it freezes, placing great pressure on anything that contains it, such as metal or plastic pipes. Expanding water can cause pipes in basements, crawl spaces, attics, garages and kitchen cabinets to rupture. Pipes against exterior walls with little or no insulation are also vulnerable to freezing.

Residents can take measures to protect water lines from freezing and prevent water pipes from rupturing during extreme cold conditions:

- Do not use a blowtorch, kerosene or propane heater or any flame device to thaw a frozen pipe.
- Keep home temperatures no lower than 55 degrees when away for an extended period of time.
- Open cabinets and closets that contain water lines to allow warm air to circulate around plumbing.

- Consider installing pipe insulation.
- Check pipe insulation periodically to make sure it is dry.
- Seal cracks in doors, windows and foundations. Small openings that consistently bring in cold air can quickly freeze pipes.
- Allow faucets to drip a little during extremely cold weather to avoid freezing.
- Learn how to shut off water valves in case a pipe bursts.

An ice dam is a ridge of ice that forms at the edge of a roof and prevents melting snow from draining off the roof. They typically occur after a cycle of days where snow melts and refreezes. The water that backs up behind the dam can leak into a home and cause damage to ceilings, walls, insulation and other areas. Experts recommend making sure the roof is well sealed, insulated and vented in the attic and eaves.

# Village Board in Brief

The Village Board of Trustees last met on December 7. Here is a summary of actions taken:

- ◆ Gave final approval of an Ordinance approving text amendments to Chapter 2 and 86 of the Glenview Municipal Code (the "Code") to update the title of the "Natural Resources Commission" to "Environment and Natural Resources Commission"

- ◆ Approved two Resolutions authorizing the purchase of equipment to outfit new police vehicles with a total project cost of \$42,073:
  - (1) A Resolution authorizing the purchase of 7 Panasonic Toughbook computers and mounting hardware for police vehicles from CDS Office Technologies of Itasca, IL in the amount of \$36,018.00
  - (2) A Resolution authorizing the purchase of 7 zebra printers and mounting hardware from Tyler Technologies of Troy, MI in the amount of \$6,055
- ◆ Approved a Resolution approving and authorizing the execution of an agreement with the Community and Economic Development Association of Cook County, Inc. for the Low Income Home Water Assistance Program
- ◆ Approved a Resolution approving and authorizing the execution of contract with BP & T Construction, of Arlington Heights, IL for streetlight painting
- ◆ Approved a Resolution approving and authorizing the execution of a Standard Software Maintenance Agreement extension with Tyler Technologies of Troy, MI for the integrated public safety computing system for a period of five years beginning January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2028
- ◆ Approved a Resolution adopting the Annual Budget for the Village of Glenview for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 2022 and ending December 31, 2022
- ◆ Approved a Resolution to approve crosswalk improvements at the intersections of Pfingsten Road at Keenan Lane and at Miller Drive
- ◆ Gave preliminary approval of an Ordinance amending the Vehicle and Traffic Municipal Code to remove weight restrictions established on the Chestnut Avenue Bridge

To qualify, a recipient must be at least 62 years old and have lived within the corporate limits of the Village for at least two years. Income for a one-person household must be below \$19,320 and for a two-person household must be below \$26,130. Income thresholds are based on 150% of the 2021 Federal Poverty Level.
