Village begins three-year process to inventory and develop plan to replace lead water service pipes

The illustration shows how water flows from the water main to a service line and into private property. The service line in the basement is typically made from the same material as the service line to the home, and Public Works crew members will inspect resident's water service line near the meter to confirm if it is lead or not.



Last summer, the Illinois General Assembly passed landmark legislation mandating the replacement of all lead service lines in the state. At the time of its passing, the law made Illinois one of only two states, along with Michigan, to mandate lead service line replacement.

Later that year, the Village Board of Trustees budgeted \$2.4 million over three years to create an inventory of Glenview's remaining lead water lines, start replacement of identified lines and perform outreach and education for residents with outdated services.

The Village will continue to replace all public lead service lines and will be considering a cost sharing program to help residents replace private lead lines. The Board will consider the program at an upcoming meeting.

Background

The drinking water in the Village of Glenview is safe. It is tested regularly for contaminants, including lead, and has never recorded an actionable lead reading.

News stories over the past decade involving lead-contaminated drinking water involve a bad water source, poor water treatment and/or lead in the distribution mains. Glenview has none of these issues. The Village purchases water from the Village of Wilmette, which sources it from Lake Michigan and treats it with the highest and best standards available. Glenview has no lead in its public distribution mains.

According to the U.S. EPA, lead can enter drinking water when plumbing materials that contain lead corrode, especially where the water has high acidity or low mineral content that corrodes pipes and fixtures. The most common sources of lead in drinking water are lead pipes, faucets, and fixtures. In homes with lead pipes that connect the home to the water main, also known as lead services lines, these pipes can be one of the most significant sources of lead in the water.

The water quality in the Village meets or exceeds all the EPA requirements, and the Village publishes and posts its water quality report annually.

The Village of Glenview prohibited the installation or use of lead service lines beginning in 1958. However, older homes constructed before this prohibition or properties annexed into the Village after that year may not have been subject to the same requirements.

Action Plan

Beginning this summer, the Village will hire a third-party contractor to investigate and inventory lead service lines, start replacement of known lead services and notify property owners if lead lines are found on private property.

The Village will also continue to replace service lines as part of its regularly scheduled Capital Improvement Program, which includes water main replacement.

Lastly, and perhaps most importantly, the Village has provided resources on its website at glenview.il.us/leadservices with information, videos and other resources to help homeowners identify if their private property has lead pipes.

Property owners can also call the Village at **847-724-1700** to schedule a representative from the Village to come out and inspect the property for lead lines. This will typically require access to the homeowner's water meter inside the home.

An initial inventory of lead water lines is required to be submitted to the Illinois EPA by April 15, 2023, and a final lead water service replacement plan by early 2024.

Village Flashback



For 40 years, Glenview threw an elaborate two-day party for village residents – and raised money for worthy projects, to boot.

The tradition was born when the whole town turned out on Sept. 15, 1917, for the dedication of the Children's Fountain – now known as the Jackman Park Bear. Glenview Days took its place the next year and became an annual late summer staple – a weekend replete with races and other athletic contests, a parade, exhibits, rides and, of course, lots of food.

A popular feature for many years was a water fight between firefighters from surrounding communities. Students from the intermediate and high schools performed concerts. Contests for kids included balloon breaking, shoe scramble, sack races, wheelbarrow races and nail driving.

The Glenview Civic Association was organized in 1922 to put on the annual celebrations and use the profits for community good. The Civic Association purchased the half block of land on Prairie Street east of Washington Street for Glenview's first public park. By 1929, it had collected enough money to construct the Civic Building there, which originally housed Village Hall and the Public Library, and today holds the Glenview Park District administrative offices.

After the Civic Association disbanded, the Glenview Chamber of Commerce, the Village Board and other civic groups continued to sponsor Glenview Days until 1950, when the Glenview Days Community Association was formed to take on the task.

The celebration was first held in a grove next to Glenview House, then an empty lot on Waukegan Road where Heinen's Grocery Store now stands. The association in 1950 purchased 14 acres for fairgrounds on Waukegan Road north of Golf Road, which was sold to Kraft after the last Glenview Days was held in 1957.

From the sales proceeds, the association was

able to continue providing financial aid through the 1960s, helping fund the Girl Scouts' Camp Lewis, the construction of Glenkirk School, high school athletic field lights and equipment, Little League baseball diamonds and bleachers, tennis court lights, the Roosevelt Pool field house, PTAs and many charitable foundations. And thankfully, the association helped fund the purchase of the Glenview History Center's Farmhouse Museum at 1121 Waukegan Road.

Crosswalk safety: Pedestrians, motorists have shared responsibility

Summertime means walkers, joggers, bikers and children spending time outdoors, enjoying all the Village has to offer. It also means cars and people sharing the streets in a safe manner.

A commonly held falsehood is that cars must yield to pedestrians at a crosswalk no matter the circumstances. Per Illinois statute, pedestrians may not leave the curb and step into traffic – even at a crosswalk – when doing so would constitute an immediate hazard.

Here are a few more things to note about crosswalk safety:

- As a general rule, pedestrians already in the roadway have the right of way, and drivers must yield. Pedestrians not yet in the right of way must yield to motorists until it's safe to enter – even at a marked crosswalk.
- Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear may not pass the stopped vehicle.
- No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a moving vehicle which is so close as to constitute an immediate hazard.
- Between intersections at which traffic-control signals are in operation, pedestrians shall not cross at any place except in a marked crosswalk.
- No pedestrian shall cross a roadway intersection diagonally unless authorized by official traffic-control devices; and, when authorized to cross diagonally, pedestrians shall cross only in accordance with the official traffic-control devices pertaining to such crossing movements.

Electronics Recycling Event Saturday, July 16

Televisions, computers and other electronics are banned from going into Illinois landfills. So take advantage of this year's one-day electronics recycling event from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, July 16, at Glenbrook South High School (4000 West Lake Avenue).

Acceptable items include: computers, monitors, cable receivers, converter boxes, DVD players, fax machines, keyboards, mouse controllers, mobile telephones, MP3 players, PDAs, printers, satellite receivers, scanners, TVs, video game consoles, VHS players and zip drives.

Additionally, participants can drop off up to six small boxes or shopping bags of documents for shredding. Destroying sensitive documents helps prevent identity theft.

And remember, the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County accepts electronics for recycling every Saturday from 9-11:30 a.m. at the Glenview Transfer Station (3 Providence Way, Des Plaines).

Last call for Fall tree planting

To keep the Village green, every spring and fall the Village coordinates the planting of new parkway trees in the public right-of-way directly adjacent to Village-maintained roads.

A general Village goal is for parkway trees to be located approximately every 40 feet. If you believe the parkway adjacent to your home could accommodate a new tree, please contact the Public Works Department at **847-724-1700** or email treeplanting@glenview.il.us.

From the Village President



I've used up a great deal of ink writing about the Economic Development Strategic Plan and Downtown Strategic Plan in this space. And for good reason – those two guiding documents are charting the path forward for Glenview's commercial corridors and Downtown revitalization.

We've made more progress since my last update on the topic, so what's one more column on the subject?

First, a quick recap on our progress so far:

- The Village released the final Economic Development Strategic Plan last summer. This document guides future development and prioritizes implementation strategies, policy and infrastructure improvements based on community goals and preferences.
- On Jan. 18, the Board approved Downtown Development Code amendments. The updated code formalizes the community vision relayed during the recent Glenview Connect process and clarifies for residents and developers what to expect from future development.
- In February, the Village purchased Downtown property at 966 Waukegan Road. This was identified as a "spark" site for development, and the proposed use of the land is for Downtown parking and to create room for a potential new restaurant.
- The Village is currently in the engineering design phase to evaluate improvements to streetscape, landscaping and decorative lighting in both The Glen Town Center and Downtown Glenview.
- In June, the Village hired a consultant to identify businesses appropriate for the Village's demographics, recruit businesses and facilitate new development.

Most recently, the Village Board passed a resolution to launch a program that would reimburse Glenview business owners for half the cost to make façade and tenant improvements.

This was a key recommendation in both the Economic Development Strategic Plan and Downtown Strategic Plan, with the aim of spurring redevelopment, increasing curb appeal and attracting new tenants to Glenview's commercial corridors.

The façade improvement program covers 50% of improvement costs up to \$37,500 to update things like exterior painting, doors, windows, awnings and signage.

The tenant improvement program will match 50% of improvement costs up to \$50,000 to update interior fixtures, such as drywall, HVAC, flooring, windows and doors, and permanent lighting.

Fire Department hires Division Chief of Training

The Glenview Fire Department has promoted John Tourtelot to the position of Division Chief of Training, who is responsible for the administration, development and execution of all training programs, including goals and objectives and personnel certifications.

Tourtelot has been with the Glenview Fire Department for 22 years and previously served with other fire departments before Glenview.

- Conducting ongoing evaluations of performance of personnel to determine if any employees need additional guidance or training
- Developing standard operating guidelines and training programs for new recruits

In this role, Tourtelot will have the opportunity to work and coordinate with neighboring departments on mutual aid drills. He'll also lead special operations training, such as diving, trench rescue, rope rescue and structure collapse.

Tourtelot's first day in the new position was June 13.

"I'm excited to take on this new position," Tourtelot said, "and help create the foundation for our training program going forward."

"We identified the need to dedicate someone full time to oversee our training program, and John brings tremendous experience and skill to the position," said Tony DeRose, Fire Chief. "Not only will this position help us perform better in our day-to-day activities, but it will also help ensure we continue to incorporate new best practices, the latest tools and technology and continue to meet or exceed state and federal standards."

Among the essential tasks Tourtelot will be performing are:

- Overseeing and developing a comprehensive training program
- Scheduling and supervising daily training activities

What's Being Built There?



1. Development Review Pending: 2660 Pfingsten Road – The Village has received an application to redevelop the southwest corner of Pfingsten and Willow into a commercial property with five buildings, featuring a mix of restaurant, retail and service uses, anchored by a Montessori school and daycare. The property owner will be requesting approvals for rezoning and final site plan at an upcoming Development Commission meeting.

2. Under Construction: Patriot-Costco/Home Depot Roundabout – A roundabout is being installed at the intersection of Patriot Boulevard and the Costco/Home Depot Access Roadway to improve traffic operations and to make the conditions safer for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists. Construction is expected to be completed in September. Learn more at glenview.il.us/roundabout.

3. Construction Pending: Chestnut Avenue Reconstruction – The Village is improving roadway safety at Chestnut Avenue between Waukegan Road and Lehigh Avenue to make the conditions safer for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists. Chestnut Avenue will be widened from two lanes to three lanes, including green medians and lighting and incorporate improved geometry at the Chestnut and Tanglewood intersection. There will also be storm sewer improvements, including additional in-line storage. Construction is expected to begin in late summer.

Keep the backyard safe this summer

Don't let hidden dangers in the backyard get in the way of summer fun. Here are a few safety tips:

Know what's in your garden

Many plants are known to cause skin irritation in humans. Poison hemlock, poison ivy and poison oak are a few plants whose names imply their inherent danger. And some common house and garden plants, like oleander and lily-of-the-valley, are poisonous if ingested. Know what plants are within reach of your children and pets. Identify the plants through pictures or bring samples to a nursery.

Be a safe griller

While you're cooking up a barbecue feast, the danger exists for starting fires and causing explosions. Proper spacing is key. Make sure the grill is placed at least 10 feet away from siding, deck railings, eaves and combustibles, such as low-hanging tree branches and shrubs. Propane and charcoal barbecue grills must only be used outdoors. Do not use them in a garage or tent because of the fire hazard and risk of exposure to deadly carbon monoxide poisoning. Charcoal grills are prohibited on multi-family unit balconies. For rules about grills on balconies, check with your building management or homeowners association. Call the Village's Inspectional Services department to get the latest information and rules regarding grilling in multi-family dwellings at 847-904-4340. Keep matches, lighters and starter fluid out of reach of children, and keep children and pets away from the grill area. Protect the chef with long barbecue mitts and long-handled grilling tools.

Careful with the pesticides

Lawn and garden chemicals are supposed to be toxic. They're designed to kill insect pests and control invasive plants. So no surprise that they can be poisonous to people and pets, too. Improper application of chemicals can mean a range of consequences. They can rub off on kids and pets playing where they were sprayed and run off into streams and lakes, contaminating the water supply. Keep exposure to a minimum. Read and follow application instructions. Better yet, try to find an alternative to chemicals.

Keep an eye on the pool

A child can drown in less than five minutes in a swimming pool with as little as two inches of water in it. The key to prevent a tragedy is to have layers of protection. That includes barriers, supervision and preparation. A fence in good repair must encompass the perimeter of the swimming pool. Never leave children unattended in or near a pool. Keep rescue equipment by the pool, and have a phone pool side with emergency numbers posted.

Mow the lawn, whack the weeds



Every summer, the Village receives complaints from residents whose neighbors let weeds or grass grow too high. Weeds and grass (excluding garden plants and native plantings) must not exceed eight inches in height, under the Village Code.

Be a good neighbor, regularly mow and maintain your lawn and public parkway. Trim back excessive landscape growth abutting public sidewalks. Even if you aren't currently residing on the property, its maintenance is still your responsibility.

Failure to comply with Village Code can lead to tickets, and could result in fines of between \$100 and \$1,000 per day, per violation.

Call the inspections department about overgrown yard or weed complaints at **847-904-4320**.

The Village also receives complaints about loud lawn care equipment. Glenview's Municipal Code limits use of this type of equipment:

- Lawn equipment may only be operated between 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.
- Throwing grass clippings in a sewer, ditch or open pit area, or upon vacant lots or public rights-of-way is prohibited.

Leave the fireworks to the professionals

The possession, transportation or use of fireworks is illegal in Illinois. The National Fire Protection Association reminds us that the only safe way to view fireworks is to attend a professional fireworks show.

Here are the facts:



More than **19,500** reported fires are started by fireworks annually.

Burns account for **44% of the 9,100 injuries** treated in emergency rooms in the month around July 4.

Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.



Half of the **fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms** were to extremities: hand, finger or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.

Children ages 10-14 had the **highest rate of fireworks injury**, with more than one-third of victims under the age of 15.

Call before you dig

You may be surprised by what's buried in your yard. Most electric, gas, water, sewer and telecommunications companies are delivering utility services underground.

To avoid personal injury and damage to those underground lines, state law requires you to contact JULIE (the Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) before any digging project, regardless of the project size or depth, such as decks, patios, trees, swing sets, signs, fountains, tents, fences, mailbox posts, room additions, gardens, swimming pools and landscaping.

Call 811 or **800-892-0123**. Or go online to illinois1call.com to place a local request. Both the call and JULIE's services are free. Marking your yard may take a day or two. Respect the markings and always dig with care.
