Capital improvement projects kicking into gear this spring

The arrival of spring brings the dawn of a construction season, and the Village of Glenview can begin its 2023 list of capital improvement projects.

Glenview’s Capital Improvement Program, or CIP, is a five-year planning instrument used to identify and coordinate the funding and timing of a wide variety of public infrastructure improvements. Core infrastructure includes roadways and underground utilities, such as water mains, sanitary sewers and storm sewers.

“Maintaining high-quality infrastructure is essential to the economic vitality and quality of life of every community,” said Jeff Brady, Glenview’s Community Development Director. “We take a great deal of pride on the condition of Village infrastructure and prioritize projects based on pavement condition, staff evaluation and resident feedback.”

This year, \$35.6 million has been allocated for road, sewer, water main and other infrastructure projects. More than half of that budget will be spent on 3.8 miles of road reconstruction and associated underground utility improvements, including water main replacements. To reconstruct a road, the entire road base and curbing is removed and rebuilt. In the process, the Village takes the opportunity to replace or repair the underlying water main, sanitary or storm mains, if applicable and necessary.

Another \$2.2 million will be used on 4.6 miles of road resurfacing and associated utility improvements. Road resurfacing involves replacing the top layer of the road surface with minor infrastructure work under the pavement along with curb and gutter replacement as needed. Generally, this is done when the underlying infrastructure materials are still in good shape and will remain serviceable for many more years.

The Village annually evaluates road projects to be included in the program based on the age, surface and base rating, staff evaluation and resident input. Funding for the Capital Improvement Program comes from the motor fuel tax, annual dedicated Village appropriation, water and sanitary sewer funds, grants and other sources.

The Village solicits feedback from residents each year about what projects to include in the upcoming CIP. Input is typically collected at an annual CIP Open House in the fall, through an interactive online map or by simply emailing capitalprojects@glenview.il.us.

Village Flashback

– Presented by the Glenview History Center

Almost as long as the Glenview Public Library's doors have been open, a volunteer group of supporters has made sure those doors stay open.

The Glenview Library Association was founded on June 16, 1939, when 25 of Hazel Zabel's friends responded to her luncheon invitation at North Shore Country Club. Her goal was to organize the group to raise critical funds for the young and struggling public library, then just eight years old.

The first benefit – a “Beer Barrel Polka” – was held three months later on the grounds of the George Nixon estate. At \$1 a head, it featured hot dogs, fortune telling and dancing – and netted \$1,000 for the library.

The Association's stated purpose was “to promote the progressive development of the Glenview Public Library and to increase its usefulness to the community.” It did so by raising money to purchase needed books and furnishings and provide extra funds for media, artwork and technology to bolster tax dollars.

Through the years, the Association sponsored art exhibits, end of summer children's reading program parties, lectures, luncheons and other events. Its signature fundraiser until the 1990s was an annual party that became known as the Book Ball, decorated with Hawaiian, Edwardian, fantasy and other inventive themes.

The name of the nonprofit organization changed in 2004 to Friends of the Glenview Library, with the continuing mission to generate private and corporate donations.

When the new library opened in 2010, space was provided for the

Friends to operate a used book store inside the building. Located by the west entrance, it offers a large selection of best sellers and hundreds of other donated books and media at bargain prices.

The Friends of the Glenview Library group continues to support the library's ongoing operations and programs through book store sales and an annual appeal.

Highlights from the Board's February meetings:

Approved IGA to support Glenview History Center

The Glenview Board of Trustees approved an Intergovernmental Agreement on Feb. 7 to partner with the Glenview Public Library and Glenview History Center (“GHC”) to support the future of the History Center.

Founded in 1965, the Glenview History Center's mission is to preserve and promote Glenview's history.

As part of the agreement, the Village and the History Center will partner on annual budget and revenue planning as part of the Village's annual budget development process. The Village will also coordinate with the History Center on short- and long-term facility maintenance needs to ensure the ongoing upkeep of the History Center facilities.

Approved license agreements for new Downtown Glenview parking lot

The Downtown Strategic Plan adopted in 2021 identified a number of “spark sites” for future development. One spark site, a vacant building at the Southwest corner of Glenview and Waukegan roads, is being reconfigured into a parking lot that wraps around the west and south side of existing buildings, adjacent to the southside of the 1700 block of Glenview Road.

On Feb. 7, the Board approved the licenses and purchase and sale agreement that will facilitate the vision and construction of this new Downtown Glenview parking lot. The next step of the development includes the design (now in progress), permitting, and construction (occurring summer 2023) of the reconfigured and expanded parking lot, followed by consideration for a potential restaurant pad along the river.

Prepare now for severe weather

There is nothing we can do to stop severe thunderstorms, lightning, tornadoes or floods from developing. However, there are things that everyone can do to minimize the impacts of severe weather on our lives. Preparedness saves lives.

What you can do to be prepared:

- 1. Stay informed:** This can be done by monitoring a weather alert radio, local radio & TV broadcasts, National Weather Service web pages, or various applications on computers and smart phones. DON'T just rely on one method – especially outdoor storm sirens – which are NOT designed to be heard indoors by everyone.
- 2. Have an emergency plan:** Do this for your home, business, schools and when you are traveling. Designate places to go to seek safe shelter from a tornado or severe thunderstorm. Pick two places to meet in case you are separated from your family or co-workers. While traveling or when away from home, know the names of the locations you are visiting - especially county and city names.
- 3. Prepare yourself and your home for an emergency:** Learn how to use a fire extinguisher, how to administer CPR, and how to turn off the electricity, gas and water supplies in your home. Inspect your home for potential hazards such as weakened trees or limbs, cracked windows or worn roofing. When you build a new structure – or renovate an existing one – there are ways to prevent wind damage to roofs, upper floors and garages. Rafters, trusses, walls and doors can all be reinforced.
- 4. Have an emergency supply kit:** Some storms produce power outages that will last for several days. Having the following items on hand will help you cope until power is restored: bottled water, non-perishable food, flashlights & extra batteries, extra clothing & blankets, an extra set of keys & cash, medications & a first aid kit, personal hygiene items, pet supplies, a weather alert radio or portable AM/FM radio.



Plan ahead with Smart911:

Create a safety profile with Smart911 so that 9-1-1 dispatchers have the information they need to help in an emergency. Smart911 is a free online sign-up service for anyone with a phone – mobile, landline or Voice Over IP (VOIP). By creating a safety profile, telecommunicators and first responders will have all necessary information in case of an emergency for a more detailed, rapid response, such as pets in a home, vehicle description and emergency contacts. Home and work addresses can also be linked to mobile phones, which do not provide an address to a 911 dispatcher. Smart911 can also proactively send you alerts from the community, including emergencies, severe weather and traffic. Your profile needs to be updated every year to stay active, so be sure to set a reminder to update it each year at smart911.com!

9-1-1 telecommunicators honored for life-saves

At the Lake Forest City Council meeting on Jan. 17, the City of Lake Forest recognized several Village of Glenview telecommunicators along with Police and Fire personnel for two life-saves.

Telecommunicators John Yaou and John Cossarek and Shift Supervisor John Bianchi were recognized for their contribution to an asphalt contractor who passed out while working at a residence in Lake Forest.

Telecommunicators John Cossarek, Jenn Kniskern and Alia Shukur

were recognized for their contribution to a full arrest (patient unconscious and not breathing), of an individual who was found on the ground in their driveway.

In both instances, telecommunicators were able to provide life-saving instructions to family members and bystanders until emergency medical services arrived.

The Glenview Public Safety Dispatch Centers provide 9-1-1 dispatch services for 18 municipal agencies, including the Glenview police and fire departments.

Need help with your taxes? Free help is available

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originally slated for 2022, but was delayed to this year due to needed gas line relocation work.

Chestnut Avenue will be widened from two lanes to three lanes (two through lanes and one bi-directional turning lane), and improved geometry at the Chestnut and Tanglewood intersection. Other improvements include a section of landscaped medians, a mid-block crosswalk, and new street lighting. There will also be storm sewer improvements, including additional in-line storage.

The addition of a third lane for left-hand turns will improve safety and traffic flow. A proposed multi-use path will accommodate pedestrians and cyclists along the north side of Chestnut Avenue.

Milwaukee Avenue/Zenith Drive Traffic Signal and Pedestrian Improvements

The Village is replacing the existing traffic signal at the intersection of Milwaukee Avenue at Zenith Drive/Castilian Court to improve safety for pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists.

The new traffic signal will include the addition of pedestrian signals, which will consist of push-buttons and countdown timers on the pedestrian signal heads. The improvements will also include minor pavement widening on the west side to accommodate truck turning movements.

This project is anticipated to start in June 2023. Construction will be coordinated with the Illinois Department of Transportation's planned roadway resurfacing of Milwaukee Avenue, which is also scheduled for 2023.

Pothole Patrol

While the Village of Glenview is responsible for maintaining the majority of Glenview's 167 miles of roadways, the Illinois Department of Transportation and the Cook County Highway Department are responsible for plowing, maintaining and repairing potholes on many major arterials running through Glenview, including East Lake Avenue, Willow Road, Golf Road, Milwaukee Avenue, Waukegan Road and more (see the chart online at glenview.il.us under Street & Sidewalk Maintenance).

Residents can report pothole problems to the Village by calling **847-724-1700**. If the pothole is on a street that the Village maintains, a Public Works crew can be dispatched to repair the problem. Information about potholes on IDOT or Cook County roads will be passed along to the appropriate jurisdictional agency.



The Sustainability Scene

Composting 101

Hello again, Glenview – we're back on the Sustainability Scene!

Let's talk about composting. Composting is nature's way of recycling. It is one of the most powerful actions we can take to reduce our trash, reduce our carbon footprint, and build healthy soil. By turning our food scraps and yard trim into compost, we can transform our waste streams into a beneficial, value-added soil amendment and use it to protect the environment and create resilient communities.

- **What exactly is composting?** Composting is the natural process of recycling organic matter, such as leaves and food scraps, into a valuable fertilizer that can enrich soil and plants.
- **What are the benefits of composting?** In addition to the benefits above, composting improves the structure and health of soil by adding organic matter. It helps the soil retain moisture and nutrients, and it attracts beneficial organisms to the soil while reducing the need for pesticides and fertilizers.
- **How do I get started?** The easiest way is to enroll in Groot's seasonal subscription service for landscape waste and composting. You'll receive a 95-gallon cart that you can throw all your landscape and compost into for collection on your regular garbage collection day. Groot will then compost the material at one of its partner facilities. To enroll in the seasonal subscription program, visit groot.com or call Groot at **800-244-1977**. You can also look into other composting companies for private, year-round collection.

If you'd like to try your hand at composting, a get-started guide and helpful information can be found online at epa.gov/recycle/composting-home.

Whether you compost at home or through Groot's subscription service, the following items can be composted: fruits, vegetables, breads/grains, pasta, cereal, dairy (such as cottage cheese, sour cream, yogurt and butter; no liquids), eggshells, coffee grounds/tea leaves, grass clippings, garden vegetables, leaves and brush.

Do not compost things like teabags/coffee filters, meat, poultry, seafood, shells/bones, paper products (paper towels, plates, napkins, egg cartons, pizza boxes), glass, plastic, Styrofoam, diapers, pet litter, liquids, grease or oil.

You know what one of the best things about composting is? It requires minimal effort, equipment, expense or expertise. It can also be quite fun, so give it a try this spring!

No Mow 'Til Mother's Day returning in 2023

The Village of Glenview and the Environment & Natural Resources Commission are once again encouraging residents to participate in the "No Mow 'Til Mother's Day" initiative.


This program invites residents to avoid mowing their lawn – or a portion of their lawn – through Mother's Day to help support the local ecology, the habitats of pollinators and area wildlife.

Own an old home? You may be eligible for historic landmark designation benefits

The Development Adjustment Commission's Historic Preservation Action Plan calls for increased promotion of historic preservation opportunities. This year, owners of single-family residences constructed before 1960 will receive a one-time promotional "birthday card" recognizing their home and providing information about the Village's Historic Landmark Eligibility & Designation processes. Glenview's historic preservation ordinance requires owner-support for designation, so the mailer is intended to ensure local property owners are aware of the program and can consider whether designation may be right for them. More than 4,700 local residents will receive a "birthday card" as part of this promotion.

What's Being Built There?



- 1. Permit Pending: Panera Drive-Thru (2512 Waukegan Road)** – On Jan. 5, the Village Board gave final approval for a conditional use entitling Panera to operate a drive-through window. The drive-thru use includes reconfiguration of the existing parking areas to accommodate the drive-thru lane, a building addition to accommodate internal drive-thru service areas for the existing restaurant and the addition of signage and landscaping in accordance with the site improvements.
- 2. Opening Soon: Extra Space Storage (3701 West Lake Ave)** – Construction for this new self-storage facility is nearing completion and included a building addition, remodeling of existing buildings, new perimeter fencing and vehicle gates, outdoor storage and modifications to existing stormwater detention areas, utilities and signage. The development was approved by the Development Adjustments Commission and Village Board in the summer of 2021.
- 3. Now Open: Corner Optical (1527 Waukegan Road)** – The Corner Optical eyewear store that was previously located at the corner of Lehigh and Glenview Road has relocated to Glen Oak Plaza at the northeast corner of Waukegan and East Lake. Corner Optical applied for and received a tenant improvement grant to upgrade their facilities and used the funding to help move into a larger location.

Election Day is almost here! Everything you need to know for the April 4 election

Offices to be elected

Municipal, township, road district, park district, public library district, school district, community college, regional board of schools and township trustees of schools are on the April 4 Consolidated Election ballot.

Register to vote

The last day to register to vote by online application is March 19 at cookcountyclerk.com/agency/register-vote. The last day to register to vote by paper application or in person is Tuesday, March 7. Registration is available at Glenview Village Hall, 2500 East Lake Avenue, weekdays during business hours; at township offices; at any Cook County Clerk's Office; and at an Illinois Secretary of State's driver's license facility.

Mail ballots

Any registered suburban Cook County voter may request a mail ballot via online application. Once verified and processed, a paper ballot will be sent to the mailing address designated. The deadline to apply is March 30. Apply online at cookcountyclerk.com/agency/vote-mail. The last day mail ballots can be postmarked is April 4.

Early voting

Glenview Village Hall is one of 51 sites serving as an early

voting polling place for the April 4 Consolidated Election. Locations are listed online here: cookcountyclerk.com/service/early-voting-locations, and you can vote at any of them.

Early voting will take place daily at Village Hall from Monday, March 20, through Monday, April 3. Hours at Glenview Village Hall are: 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Saturday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sundays.

Election Day

Registered suburban Cook County voters can only vote in their home precinct on Election Day. Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Village Hall is NOT a polling place on Election Day.

To find your polling place on April 4, go online to: cookcountyclerk.com/service/your-voter-information. Residents who are not registered may register and cast a ballot on Election Day thanks to same-day registration and voting. Those who wish to register on Election Day must present two qualifying forms of ID.
