## New option for home improvement project permits

Obtaining a permit for a home improvement project can sometimes be a time-consuming, complex process.

Glenview has initiated a new review option to make the process easier. It will provide reviews of most residential project plans on the same day with the aim of issuing the permit within a single day.

Called Same Day Permit Review, the idea is to have various department reviewers – building, zoning and engineering – have access to a permit application and other required documentation over the course of a single session.

It's a departure from the process most municipalities and counties follow, that can result in lengthy processing times with frequent back and forth communications, sometimes over the course of many weeks.

Glenview's new review option is designed to allow more consistent applications of rules, be more streamlined

and provide quicker turnaround times, which facilitate a more rapid construction start. That makes the village a more appealing place to do remodeling and construction work.

Once clerks determine the application is eligible, and check the contractor's license and bonds, a file is created that will pass through reviewers' hands within a conference room.

Depending on the proposed work, required submittals should include a completed application; an accurate plat of survey; scaled site plans showing existing and proposed work; and, if applicable, manufacturers' specifications for equipment, construction material details and floor plans/elevations.

Changes discussed with the owner or authorized applicant can be agreed to and initialed on the spot. If plans are prepared by an architect, the owner or applicant can bring in a stamped and sealed letter from the architect authorizing them to make plan corrections. Some plans may receive contingent approval, depending on open items pending, such as an engineering inspection sign off.

The option is expected to be expanded to commercial remodeling projects later this year.

Along with this new permit review option, applicants for single-family home improvement projects can take advantage of a 25 percent discount on permit fees offered by the Village through March 31.



Eligible residential projects include:

- ✓ Remodeling (i.e. bathroom, kitchen, basement)
- ✓ Demolition
- ✓ Foundation repair
- ✓ Pool removal
- ✓ Non-structural fire damage repair
- ✓ Drywall associated with water damage
- ✓ Spot survey

Residential projects with less than a 400-square-foot increase in impervious lot coverage may be eligible:

- ✓ New or expanding driveway
- ✓ Walk
- ✓ Stoop or patio
- ✓ Porch
- ✓ Fence
- ✓ Pergola
- ✓ Pool or spa
- ✓ Shed
- ✓ Detached garage
- ✓ Yard drain
- ✓ One-story addition adjacent to single-family
- ✓ Generator
- ✓ Air conditioning unit
- ✓ Tennis or basketball court

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## FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT



While the Village Board of Trustees enacts laws and policies at our twice monthly meetings, discussions about items on the agenda often first take place at Board workshops. We are trying a new format for these workshops this year by scheduling most to precede regular Board meetings in hopes that it is more convenient for residents.

The workshops allow the Board to focus on a single complex issue or a few smaller issues, prompting deeper discussion and debate. That way, we can think through choices and give direction and guidance to staff on formulating the ordinances and resolutions which we then present and vote on at regular Board meetings.

At 6:30 p.m. Feb. 21, before the 7:30 p.m. regular Board business meeting, we'll hear a report from Village staff on electric aggregation, and then discuss whether the Board would like staff to investigate options for purchasing electricity from a supplier other than ComEd for residents and small businesses.

In 2009, the Illinois General Assembly passed a law permitting municipalities to contract with alternative electric suppliers. ComEd would still serve as the power system distributor – in other words, the utility would still own and maintain the power lines and associated infrastructure. Through a bidding process that would have to be authorized by referendum, the Village might be able to arrange for residents to select another supplier which currently advertises lower rates than are now available.

You've probably already read articles and gotten solicitations from electricity vendors about this option.

We know Glenview residents and merchants have strong opinions about electric rates. But before we ask them to make a decision, the Board needs to fully understand what electric aggregation is and all its implications. That will be part of our Feb. 21 workshop discussion, and probably a few subsequent meetings.

Topics for other workshops, which would begin at 6:30 p.m. at Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road, have been tentatively scheduled over the next few months. They include:

- development of more user-friendly website feature for fiscal transparency initiatives
- review of the Infrastructure Management Services report of Village street conditions
- report on the feasibility of a stormwater utility fee to fund flood control measures
- traffic improvements for the library and surrounding area
- review of budget policy assumptions for 2013

## Request a parkway tree

The Village manages an ongoing parkway tree planting program in order to help keep Glenview green. Each year, new trees are planted along public parkways and unhealthy or dead trees are removed. ## What to do with old electronics

Pitching unwanted electronic devices into the trash bin or placing them at curb side for pickup is no longer acceptable in Glenview or other Illinois communities, under the Electronics Products Recycling and Reuse Act.

The new 2012 rules ban 17 electronic products from Illinois landfills, including televisions, monitors, printers, computers, video cassette recorders, portable digital music players, digital video disc players and video game consoles.

Two permanent electronics drop-off sites are provided by the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County at the Glenview Transfer Station, 1151 N. River Road, across from the Maryville Academy, which is open from 9 to 11:30 a.m. most Saturdays; and Winnetka Public Works, 1390 Willow Road, which is open 10 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesdays and 1-3 p.m. Thursdays.

## Voting information

### Early voting



Glenview Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road, is serving as an early election polling place for the March 20 General Primary Election. Early voting will take place from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays from Feb. 27 to March 15.

State law requires early voters to display valid photo identification to an election official before receiving a ballot to vote early. Valid forms of ID include a current driver's license, state-issued ID card, university/college ID or another government-issued ID with a photograph.

Early voting is conducted on touch screens that store every ballot style in the county, permitting any voter in suburban Cook County to vote at any location.

### Register to vote

Citizens can register to vote up to one week before an election, depending on certain guideline limits and where grace-period registrants can vote.

The League of Women Voters of Glenview has scheduled two voter registration events:

- ▶ 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 18, at Park Center, 2400 Chestnut Ave.
- ▶ 4 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 21, at the Glenview Public Library, 1930 Glenview Road

To be eligible to register to vote, one must be a U.S. citizen, 18 years or older on the next election day and reside in the jurisdiction for 30 days prior to an election.

Illinois residents may also register in person at the office of the election authority, at a driver's license facility or via mail using the Illinois Voter Registration Application.

# VILLAGE BOARD AT WORK

The Village Board met Jan. 3 and 17. Some of the items acted upon included:

- ◆ Executed a four-year collective bargaining agreement with the Glenview Professional Firefighters Association, IAFF Local 4186. The contract, which expires Dec. 31, 2014, grants a 3 percent wage increase in 2011 and 2012 and a 2.5 percent wage increase in 2013 and 2014; and includes increases in health insurance premium contributions and plan design changes
- ◆ Approved a zoning variation for Astellas Pharma US, Inc., 1 Astellas Way, to allow installation of two 330-square-foot front wall signs for the office complex.
- ◆ Approved final site plan review and final subdivision for Prairie Materials, 2900 Old Willow Road. The concrete producer and distributor plans to use the north 1.83 acres of the property for additional material storage and a formal detention area.
- ◆ Approved final site plan review for DRL Enterprises Inc., 2301 Ravine Way, to allow expansion of an existing

parking lot and a new curb cut onto Old Willow Road

- ◆ Heard a report on the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago's ongoing efforts to develop county-wide projects to reduce regional flooding. Preliminary engineering design is commencing for a 1,100-acre-foot of detention adjacent to the West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River upstream of Glenview.
- ◆ Certified the Motor Fuel Tax Fund appropriation for the 2012 Road Resurfacing and MARS programs. The certification is required in order for Illinois to appropriate \$1.25 million of MFT funds, which will be used for the road pavement and storm sewer improvements.
- ◆ Purchased a high-speed digital color copier and a three-year service agreement for \$28,077 from Konica Minolta Business Solutions of Rolling Meadows.
- ◆ Renewed the Village's membership in Chicago's North Shore Convention and Visitors Bureau for \$56,610 covering July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2012. The Village has been a member since 2008.
- ◆ Executed a contract for 2012 legisla-

tive services with Cullen and Associates for \$52,800. The firm represents the Village's position on public policy issues and seeks out state/federal grant funding opportunities.

- ◆ Executed a Redevelopment Agreement with the owners of 1803-1805 and 1809-1837 Waukegan Road. The agreement sets forth the terms and conditions under which the Chestnut Avenue/Waukegan Road intersection would be reconstructed to include an improved eastern leg located in the shopping center. Redesign of the intersection was one priority of the 2009 Waukegan Road Corridor Plan.
- ◆ Authorized purchase of an ambulance for \$224,025 through the Northwest Municipal Conference Joint Purchasing Program and declared as surplus the sub-standard unit it will replace, making it eligible for trade in.

## Leak detection efforts in water systems paying off

Since 2007, the Village has been on the lookout for leaks in water mains that are undetectable from the surface and result in water loss that is unaccounted for.

A contractor hired by the Village has surveyed Glenview's 260 miles of water distribution pipes and the 54 miles of pipes that are part of the Village-owned North Maine Utilities, which serves customers in unincorporated areas around Glenview.

Using sensitive sound-intensifying instruments, crews with ADS Environmental Services "listened" to all hydrants and strategic main line valves to detect where water could be leaking.

Subsequent investigations were conducted in suspect areas using an electronic leak correlator to pinpoint the leaks for repair by Public Works staff.

The program has paid off. Had the leaks not been located and repaired, water losses could have totaled \$441,668 over the last four years in both systems, which would have required rate hikes.

Minimizing water loss helps ensure the Village's systems are using their allocation of Lake Michigan water efficiently. Locating the leaks through the surveys also allows them to be repaired before they come more serious.

Additionally, Glenview realized savings by jointly bidding for leak detection services with the Village of Winnetka in 2010. Glenview's share of the three-year contract with ADS, at \$103,600, took advantage of economics of scale that lowered the price for both municipalities and locked in the rates.
