## 2017 Village Budget

# Investments while managing future costs

The Village of Glenview's 2017 spending plan maintains high service levels this year while making sure spending in the next several years is controlled.

The \$132.3 million budget is structurally balanced, so that ongoing revenues support ongoing expenses and one-time revenues are used only for one-time expenditures. It addresses escalating public safety pension obligations and commits to substantial Village infrastructure improvements.

To keep finances healthy for the long term, Glenview continues to identify cost efficiencies and opportunities; use Village resources responsibly; depend on public-private partnerships; and work with other governments to share costs and leverage resources. To help manage costs in the next several years, the 2017 Village budget includes a nominal property tax increase. The additional \$200,000 generated represents an increase of about \$10 on the Village portion of the average property owner's annual bill. An increase in the cost of mid-sized building permit fees is expected to raise \$160,000, to help ensure new developments fund the inspectional services they create.


By aggressively seeking grant funding, the Village in 2017 will be able to move ahead on a number of important road and sewer improvement projects. To that end, an increase in the local motor fuel tax to 4 cents a gallon, from 2 cents a gallon, is expected to raise an additional \$420,000 that will be dedicated to capital improvement projects. As well, the Village will for another year earmark \$5 million in operating revenue – from taxes, license, permits, fees, investments and other charges – to help fund capital projects on a pay-as-you-go basis, which is key to sustainability.

Those and other revenue sources total \$16.9 million that will be spent in 2017 on capital improvements. Projects include:


- Consolidating three aging pipes into a single water main and resurfacing Harlem Avenue from Golf Road to Glenview

## Give the tree a green goodbye



You don't have to throw your real Christmas tree in the trash. The tree is biodegradable, which means it can be easily reused or recycled for mulch. Trees can be dropped off until January 31 at these designated collection points:

- Glenview Public Works, 2498 East Lake Avenue
- Johns Park, 2101 Central Road
- Flick Park, 3600 Glenview Road
- Cunliff Park, 540 Echo Lane
- Cole Park, 1031 Kenilworth Avenue
- Willow Park, 2600 Greenwood Avenue

Alternatively, residents in single-family homes, duplexes and multifamily properties that have opted into the Village's refuse and recycling program can put trees, wreaths and garlands out with the regular garbage during the month of January. Groot will collect them at no additional charge. All ornaments, lights and tinsel should be removed from trees. Do NOT cover the tree with a plastic disposal bag.

Multifamily dwellings that are not part of the Village's waste contract should refer to their management companies for the appropriate method of disposal.

And remember, holiday lights can also be recycled. Drop them off in the marked receptacle outside the Public Works Department through February 24.

## Resolve to recycle on 1st Fridays

Glenview Village Hall can be a one-stop destination for many recyclables through the First Friday Recycling program. Safely dispose of unwanted medications and sharps and mercury-containing thermometers and thermostats in the lobby at 2500 East Lake Avenue on the first Friday of the month. Drop-off hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on these 2017 dates:

## Housing cost aid

Completed applications, including all needed documentation, will be accepted from February 6 to 10 – one week only.

Recipients must be at least 62 years old and have lived within the corporate limits of the Village for at least two years.

For a one-person household, total yearly income must be below \$17,655. For a two-person household, total yearly income must be below \$23,895.

The Village of Glenview has approved up to \$1,960 per year toward rent or property taxes for qualifying Glenview senior citizens.

Since 2005 the Village of Glenview has been a place of bold ideas. Residents certainly noticed the most enterprising, but a lot of change happened seamlessly. # Hardware store purchase to boost revitalization

To continue efforts to revitalize Glenview's downtown, the Village Board of Trustees is moving to purchase the 0.66-acre parcel at 1850 Glenview Road, which had previously been the site of Bess Hardware.

In business for 29 years, the hardware store closed in 2010 and remained vacant in a prime location next to the downtown Glenview railroad station.

The Village Board for more than a decade has focused on the revitalization of downtown as a top Village priority. Significant downtown planning efforts have been completed, including a new state-of-the-art public library on the west end of downtown and a major grocery store anchoring the east end of downtown. Within these planning efforts, the Bess property is considered a visually important corner and an important downtown revitalization priority by the Village Board.

Despite interest from several developers, the seller and prospective buyers were not able to agree on economic terms for the purchase and sale of the site.

The Village's primary goal is to expedite the redevelopment of this site and seek a high quality reuse that compliments and is consistent with the downtown plan's vision. Therefore, the Village Board executed a purchase and sale agreement December 6 for \$2.225 million.

Located in the Downtown Develop-

ment District, the site can be developed for a variety of uses, including retail, office and residential. A strong presence on the corner was envisioned in the 2006 Downtown Revitalization Plan.

The property is being acquired using the Village's Permanent Fund. The Permanent Fund was established in 1996 when the Village acted as the master developer of the former Glenview Naval Air Station, now known as The Glen. As a master developer fee, 20 percent of gross land sale proceeds from redevelopment of The Glen were deposited into the Permanent Fund. The

fund's purpose is to provide one-time investments within Glenview but outside The Glen, primarily focused on infrastructure and economic development opportunities. Using the money in this fund results in no impact on Glenview taxpayers and avoids establishing a Tax Increment Financing District to incent redevelopment of the downtown, an economic tool many other communities are using or have used to fund revitalization of their downtowns.

Because of the high priority put on the revitalization of the downtown business district, the Village has stepped in when

necessary to help make certain the vision of the Downtown Revitalization Plan can be realized. The importance of developing priority locations in accordance with the plan boosts redevelopment opportunities for the entire downtown.

For instance, in 2007 the Village Board purchased the parcel at 1020 Waukegan Road after the owner closed the Dominick's grocery store there. The Village was able to attract a high-quality Heinen's store, which opened in 2014. The site was returned to the property tax roll, generates sales taxes and creates jobs.


The Village will market the former Bess site consistent with the preferred development strategies envisioned in the Downtown Revitalization Plan. The plan encourages a vibrant, pedestrian-friendly downtown by focusing on a proposed building's appearance and placement through a form-based code rather than conventional land use criteria like height, density or building bulk.

The Village intends to seek proposals from potential developers for the site, which will be evaluated by the Village Board. Once the board selects a developer and negotiates a sale, the plan will be subject to the Village's regulatory review and public input process similar to any other development proposal. And once the Bess property is resold, the proceeds can be returned to the Permanent Fund to help fund other one-time investments.

## Public safety dispatch center adds 4

By July 2017, the Glenview Public Safety Dispatch Center will begin providing police dispatch services for three additional communities – Kenilworth, Northfield and Winnetka – and police and fire dispatch services for Glencoe. The Village of Glenview authorized agreements with those four communities in November. That brings to 13 the municipalities served by the center from two locations – which already provide police dispatch for Grayslake, Hainesville, Niles, Morton Grove, and Highwood; and police and fire dispatch for Glenview, Highland Park, Lake Forest, and Lake Bluff.

The consolidated center has achieved savings for all municipalities through shared resources and infrastructure and improved service levels. As well, the participating municipalities can share regional data without spending additional public funds.





# Have you made sure your home is winterized?

Coping with cold temperatures, snow, and ice takes planning.

## Frozen pipes

Frozen or broken water pipes can lead to major damage to your home. Water expands as it freezes, placing great pressure on anything that contains it. If pipes in crawl spaces or along outside walls aren't properly insulated, they can freeze and rupture. Follow these tips:

- Check thoroughly to identify and seal all cold air drafts near water pipes, including basement windows and crawl space vents. Small openings that consistently bring in cold air can quickly freeze pipes.
- Consider installing pipe insulation around susceptible pipes.
- If you have an underground lawn sprinkling system, shut off the water supply and properly drain the system.
- If you vacation during winter months, set the thermostat no lower than 55°F before leaving to prevent frozen pipes and sprinkler systems.
- Open cabinets and closets that contain water lines to allow warm air to circulate around plumbing.
- Learn how to shut off water valves in case a pipe bursts.



## Ice dams

An ice dam is a ridge of ice that forms at the edge of a roof and prevents melting snow from draining off the roof. They typi-

cally occur after a cycle of days where snow melts and refreezes.

The water that backs up behind the dam can leak into a home and cause damage to ceilings, walls, insulation and other areas. Experts recommend reducing the risk of damage by making sure the roof is well sealed, insulated and vented in the attic and eaves.

## Fire risks

December, January and February are the leading months for U.S. home fires. Cooking, heating, holiday decorations and candles all contribute to an increased risk of fire during the winter months.

To avoid the risk of starting a fire, never use a natural gas oven to heat your home, even for a short time. If you must use an electric heater, be sure not to overload the circuit. Do not use a heater in a bathroom or other areas where it may come in contact with water. Turn portable heaters off when you leave or go to sleep, and only use a properly rated extension cord.

With furnaces and space heaters, a carbon monoxide detector is recommended to prevent extreme or even mild exposure to the toxic gas.

Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from heating equipment, like a furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater. Remember to turn off portable heaters when leaving the room or going to bed.

## Discount on home project fees

For a 20th year, the Village is offering a 25 percent discount on permit fees for single-family home improvement projects, such as room additions, interior remodeling, detached garages, sheds, decks, driveways, and swimming pools. The permit fee discount is available now through March 31, 2017.

By submitting plans during the winter, when such activity is usually slower, permits can be issued faster and residents can avoid the delays that may occur during the busier spring and summer months.

# Glenview water, sewer rates changing

An increase in water and sanitary sewer rates was enacted for 2017 for Glenview water customers to cover the increased cost of buying Lake Michigan water from Wilmette and fund ongoing maintenance and capital improvements in the both systems.

Effective January 1, 2017, Glenview residents will pay \$6.47 per 1,000 gallons used, up from \$6.06 per 1,000 gallons in 2016, a 6.75-percent increase. The quarterly fixed water charge is unchanged, which for most residences is \$7.86 per quarter. Fixed sewer rate charges are unchanged from 2016, but the consumption charge is increasing from \$1.32 per 1,000 gallons used to \$1.35, or 2 percent.

For an average resident using 16,000 gallons of water per quarter, that translates to an annual increase of \$28.16 on their water and sewer bill.

Of the 6.75-percent increase in the water consumption rate, 40 percent is due to the 2017 increase in the cost of purchased water. The new rates reflect an 8-percent rate increase for the purchase of Lake Michigan water from Wilmette and nearly \$1.6 million worth of scheduled water delivery system improvements. Water purchase alone accounts for 29 percent of the 2017 Water Fund expenses.



## Glenview water bill estimates for 2017

Rate changes effective January 1 will impact the Glenview utility bill that customers receive quarterly. This chart lists estimated increases based on water and sanitary sewer consumption.

Generally, the cost to maintain the water system remains constant regardless of how much water Glenview customers use. Rates are reviewed annually to ensure they cover the costs to provide water and sanitary sewer service and that appropriate investment is being made in capital infrastructure.

In June 2016, the Village completed a water meter replacement program to replace aging meters and upgrade the system to an automated meter reading process to provide better customer service, reduce operational costs, and achieve greater reading accuracy for all accounts for fair and equitable billing.

Road, at just over \$3 million, with a federal grant covering 70 percent of the resurfacing costs;

- Replacing the water main and resurfacing Glenview Road from Church Street to Waukegan Road, along with improving the streetscape with new street lights, parkway trees, benches and sidewalks, at an estimated \$2.5 million, with a federal grant covering more than half the cost;
- Constructing an underground stormwater detention system to address flooding issues in the Bonnie Glen neighborhood and at Lyon Elementary School, at an estimated \$2.9 million;
- Reconstructing 1.6 miles of roadways, at a total cost of \$3.55 million, including portions of Topp Lane, Raleigh Road, Baffin Road, Drake Road and Parkview Road;
- Resurfacing or substantially patching 4.3 miles of roadways, at a total cost of \$2.22 million, including Rolling Pass north of Glenview Road, Pfingsten Road south of East

Lake Avenue, West Lake Avenue from Patriot Boulevard to Lehigh Avenue, and Lehigh Avenue from Rugen Road to Patriot Boulevard; and

- Water and sanitary sewer improvements, at a total cost of nearly \$1.6 million.

Glenview is well positioned to continue a similar investment in capital improvements for the next several years. The Village has secured \$16.6 million in

grant funds from 2016 through 2021.

As a testament to the Village's strong financial operations, Moody's Investors Services recently reaffirmed the Village's AAA credit rating. Moody's recognized the Village's "consistently strong financial operations and robust economic profile" as a reason for the rating. The higher credit rating allows the Village to borrow needed funds at lower interest rates, resulting in savings to residents. As of September 2016, only 36 of 1,299 incorporated municipalities in Illinois – less than 3 percent – maintain an AAA rating,

The Village Board reviewed and refined the 2017 budget at three public workshops, and capital improvement projects were presented at a public open house. Public hearings were held on the property tax levy and on the budget. Both were adopted December 6, 2016.

The budget process isn't the only opportunity for resident input. Feedback and suggestions on Village programs and services are always welcome.

# Village Board in brief

The Village Board of Trustees met November 1 and 15 and December 6. Here is a summary:

- ◆ Approved a conditional use and final site plan review for Glenview Luxury Imports, 301 Waukegan Road, to allow operation of an automotive sales facility, auto service, and auto detailing, each a B-3 General Service use in a B-2 General Business District.
- ◆ Amended the Village Code to codify the permit application process for fireworks displays within Glenview, to allow the Fire Chief final approval and removing the requirement for Village Board approval.
- ◆ Authorized a Class F-5 liquor license for Rock Star Nails and Spa, 2311 Willow Road, which allows the sale of alcohol by the glass for consumption on the premises in an establishment in which the primary and principal business is the provision of health and beauty personal services and in which the sale of alcohol is secondary and incidental.
- ◆ Awarded a contract to DiMeo Brothers of Elk Grove Village for \$123,819 to install high-capacity drainage inlets and patch the roadway on Golfview Road between Surrey Lane and Wagner Road to mitigate stormwater flooding.
- ◆ Amended fees charged in the Glenview Municipal Code to:
  - eliminate annual business license renewals in favor of initial business license fees of \$45 (general) and \$95 (food establishment) to cover the first year of Village administrative costs for a typical business, effective January 1, 2017;
  - include an annual health inspection fee for restaurants of \$95 to cover the typical two annual Village Sanitarian inspections along with related coordination and follow-up;
  - increase some building permit fees to cover the cost of delivering services including plan review, inspections, and clerk services, and bring them up to those charged by comparable communities;
  - increase by 3 percent ambulance transport rates for residents, non-residents, and per-mile transport fees; and
  - increase the cost of the animal impound fee to \$50 per day to fully recover the amount charged by the kennel.
- ◆ Authorized an agreement with the Suburban Tree Consortium for \$259,000 to purchase trees for the Village's 2017 tree planting program.
- ◆ Established Special Service Area 97 for the installation of curb and gutter for The Circles neighborhood. This financing method for homeowners to fund capital improvements will allow curb and gutter installation for 80 homes along Raleigh, Baffin, Drake, York and Hudson roads.
- ◆ Approved the 2017 Fourth of July parade route, which is being moved to Glenview Road because of construction on Harlem Avenue.
- ◆ Authorized a one-year contract extension with Trees "R" Us for tree removal, stump removal and tree trimming request for \$324,500.
- ◆ Authorized a one-year contract extension with Hoving Clean Sweep of West Chicago for \$127,870 for 2017 street sweeping services.
- ◆ Supported the request by North American Corporation, 2101 Claire Court for a Class 6(b) extension under the Cook County Ordinance for the existing 250,000-square-foot building and consented to the filing of a Cook County Class 6(b) application for a 100,000-square-foot building addition.
- ◆ Waived administrative rules and adopted on first reading an ordinance granting final site plan review for the Glenview Road Streetscape project from 1700 to 1880 Glenview Road, which permits the reconstruction and improvement of the existing sidewalk, parkway trees and landscaping, lighting, and street furniture.
- ◆ Updated the Village's Special Service Area policy, the funding mechanism available for residents to voluntarily fund infrastructure improvements and repay the cost as part of their tax bill over a period of time, to ensure fairness and equity for existing and future participants.
