Electricity supply referendum on November ballot

Residents of Glenview will be asked in November whether the Village should try to negotiate lower electric rates for residents and small businesses.

If approved in a November 6 referendum that has been authorized by the Board of Trustees, the Village would have the opportunity to seek competitive pricing from electricity suppliers, rather than relying on the standard procedure that ComEd currently uses. Glenview would be able to combine the electricity supply needs of residences and small businesses into a pool to obtain volume pricing for them. By purchasing electricity in this manner, the Village would expect to save money for those customers.

Illinois for over a decade has allowed competition among electricity suppliers. But in 2010, the Illinois legislature gave municipalities the ability to contract with alternative electric suppliers under a single contract that would include residences and small businesses.

Under the new procedure, residents and businesses would automatically be switched to the new supplier unless they chose to opt out of the program, and remain with their current electrical supplier. And ComEd would continue to distribute power to Glenview properties and be responsible for maintenance and service issues, including emergency repairs, billing questions and outage issues.



In order for the Village Board to create a municipal aggregation program, the referendum would first need to be approved by a majority of voters.

To date, similar referenda have been approved in more than 200 Illinois municipalities, primarily because this new process has proven to lower a portion of the electric bills.

If Glenview voters sign off, the Village Board next year would have the flexibility to evaluate supplier bids for the best possible pricing. That includes new rates ComEd would be able to offer in June 2013, when ComEd's current electricity-purchasing contract, which locked the utility into prices that have since decreased, expires.

The Village Board could also consider partnering with Wilmette and Kenilworth by joining their consortium, thereby saving on administrative costs and expanding the purchase pool to obtain better economies of scale.

Or the Village could forego action on electric aggregation and remain with ComEd for the supply of electricity.

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FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT



Glenview officially became home to Astellas Pharma, a Japanese pharmaceutical company, with a recent grand opening that drew Illinois Governor Pat Quinn; U.S. Congressman Robert Dold; Astellas President and CEO Masao Yoshida; Okamura Yoshifumi, Consul General of Japan in Chicago; and other dignitaries.

The campus, with its two stunning seven-story, blue glass buildings, is a proud addition to our town. Not only does it give Glenview yet another global presence and helps establish Illinois as a leading hub of life sciences, but the company's new corporate headquarters for the Americas also means an investment of about \$140 million in Illinois as part of its expansion. In addition to the more than 1,000 employees now working there, about 150 new high-tech jobs will be added, boosting job growth in this region.

I am particularly struck with Astellas' commitment to green technology and emphasis on sustainability, such as the use of wood from managed forests and recycled and locally manufactured materials. I am told that every element that went into planning these buildings was in harmony with other elements – from the landscaping to the placement on the site to the buildings themselves.

As well, the cooperative efforts by the local governments of Glenview, Northbrook and Prospect Heights helped this new headquarters become a reality. First, all the details had to be discussed at several workshops and joint board meetings before we could even move forward to the planning stage. Then, there were a number of joint planning meetings to address the optimum site and building conditions that were ultimately set forth in intergovernmental agreements.

One of the most important aspects of this project is the property tax generation that will support West Northfield School District 31 and Glenbrook High School District 225. The decision by Astellas to locate in Glenview will benefit our school children for decades to come.

Astellas' confidence in choosing Glenview should also spill over to spur development of the adjacent 40 acres. These glass-encased buildings can be the anchor for the remainder of the site at Willow and Sanders roads.

And the company has already made its philanthropic presence known, with Astellas USA Foundation becoming a sponsor for several local events and initiatives.

The Astellas grand opening came on the heels of announcements by two other companies to build offices in Glenview, which you can read about on page 5.

This interest by corporations to invest in our community is a hopeful sign of continuing improvement in our local economy following several years of downturn.

On behalf of the Village of Glenview, we welcome Astellas to its new home and wish it much success.

ComEd works on storm response improvements

Remember last summer's intense storms, and resulting widespread power outages? Food spoiled in idle refrigerators, air conditioners ceased cooling and sump pumps went dormant for days. Glenview and other municipalities got few answers on when the electricity would start to flow again.

Hundreds of thousands of residents in Glenview and other suburbs were without power for prolonged periods, straining the municipalities' abilities to protect the health and safety of residents and restore critical operations. Communications with ComEd were inconsistent and less than concise.

In the aftermath came this realization: A better system was needed so that local governments could work with ComEd to better respond and communicate with residents and businesses.

Leaders from across ComEd's service territory, including Glenview Village Manager Todd Hileman, began a series of intense meetings with ComEd officials. Working with the communities were the Northwest Municipal Conference and state legislators.

Those meetings resulted in agreement on a framework for improving ComEd's reliability as well as storm restoration and communications procedures. Legislation passed in October 2011 included reliability performance goals that were filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission



so that they would be enforceable.

One of the new collaborations – aimed at coordinating ComEd's response and improving customer service during significant outage-related events – is ComEd's plan to establish 17 Joint Operation Centers throughout the utility's service territory. If necessary, one of those temporary centers would be located at the Glenview Police Department for 17 communities in the "Skokie-Techy" region, serving a total of more than 200,000 customers.

Setting up a Joint Operations Center is triggered once 20 percent of the region's total customers are without service for more than three hours, which will be considered an area outage emergency. For the "Skokie-Techy" region, that equates to over 40,000 customers. The center would be staffed around the clock

by a ComEd restoration specialist and representatives from area municipalities until service to priority facilities is restored. Priority facilities include hospitals, fire stations, water pumping facilities, nursing homes and senior housing complexes without backup generators

Under the new process, dedicated representatives will be able to dial direct to ComEd's command center in Joliet on behalf of groups of municipalities, rather than each community acting on its own.

Accountability is also part of the plan. Within 60 days of completing an outage restoration mission through a Joint Operations Center, ComEd and the municipalities in an impacted region will conduct a complete evaluation and review.

ComEd is undertaking other efforts to modernize its electric grid and better communicate during crisis situations. Several technology improvements aimed at allowing quicker response times and improved customer services include:

- A smart phone app to report service interruptions and pay bills online;
- A newly-acquired, \$1 million regional mobile command center that can be deployed to the worst-hit areas in a storm;
- A responsive text-messaging system to report outages and receive service updates;
- An interactive, color-coded outage map on ComEd's website, updated every 30 minutes, that will allow customers to report and view outages; and
- A revamp of the annual report summaries provided to municipalities.

Please note: ComEd does not yet have the technology that will pinpoint outage locations. Village officials urge the utility's customers to enter ComEd's phone number (800-334-7661) into mobile phones so that they can report an outage to ComEd quickly.

Circuit improvements

Over the past several months, ComEd has been making improvements designed to protect and strengthen the electrical infrastructure within Glenview. The upgrades in some areas have included:

- installing Hendrix cables, which are shielded, bundled overhead cable designed to prevent short circuits that normally occur after a wire comes into contact with small trees and falling branches;
- installing new trip savers, which are fuses that reset after some minor events;
- replacing frequently faulty cables;
- installing feeder tie-ins, which are expected to help provide a redundant feed during an outage; and
- performing extra tree trimming.

Time to sell and celebrate

The summer months bring residents out for two seasonal staples: block parties and garage sales.

The Village of Glenview allows block parties on all residential streets, but they must not block intersections, cul-de-sacs or other roadways.

To schedule a block party, first obtain a block party permit by filling out a one-page application available on the Village’s website or from the Village Manager’s Office at Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road. There is no charge for the permit.

Information required includes the date and time of the party, a basic site plan of the street to be closed and a contact’s address and phone number.

Only moveable barriers – which will be dropped off and picked up by Village workers – can be used to control traffic. Blocking streets with vehicles is prohibited.

And if you’d like, you can request a visit from police officers or firefighters. They’ll try to attend provided there are no emergencies during the party’s scheduled time.

Bargain hunters look forward at this time of year to perusing garage sales, which do not require permits in residential areas.

Signs advertising a garage sale cannot exceed nine square feet, and may be placed in the parkway in front of a residence for up to three days. If the residence does not front on a major thoroughfare, a second sign may be placed in the parkway of the closest thoroughfare for the days of the sale.



Removal of all posted signs after the sale is requested.

Got the dot? It could save your life

Glenview is participating in the Illinois Yellow Dot program, a state-wide initiative designed to provide vital medical information on vehicle drivers and passengers.

Yellow Dot kits are available at Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road, in the Village Manager’s Office and the Resolution Center, and the Glenview Police Department, 2500 E. Lake Ave.



The kits include a card for a photograph and personal medical and contact information that can be stored in the glove compartment. Information should include name, emergency contact, personal physician, medical conditions, recent surgeries, allergies and current medication.

Also included in the kits is a Yellow Dot decal. When the decal is placed on the rear-facing window on the driver’s side, first responders to a serious crash know to look in the glove compartment for the vital information needed in the “golden hour,” the first hour following a trauma when those injured have their best chance for survival.

Office park to get 2 new buildings

Glenview's Prairie Glen Corporate Campus continues to attract and retain corporate headquarters, following the announcements of two recent office construction agreements.

New offices for Anixter International and the American College of Chest Physicians are expected to bring a total of at least 240 jobs to Glenview and about \$4 million in additional property taxes over a 10-year period.

Anixter, the electrical wire, cable and data communications global distributor that moved its corporate headquarters to the campus in 2003, intends to add 60,000 square feet of office space and at least 150 additional jobs to a 4-acre parcel adjacent and east of its current site.


Anixter hopes to break ground this fall for occupancy by April 2013. Its corporate headquarters in The Glen currently employs about 670 and produces about \$1 million in annual property taxes.

The American College of Chest Physicians has entered into a development agreement with Glenview to move its headquarters, now in Northbrook, to a new 45,000-square-foot office building and training facility to a 5.25-acre parcel in the campus.

The college, founded in 1935, is a not-for-profit organization representing more than 17,800 members in 100 countries. Its 90 employees provide education in cardiopulmonary, critical care and sleep medicine.

The investments from both office projects will have a net positive impact on the Tax Increment Financing District at The Glen. Property taxes from Glen properties are the TIF's primary source to pay for the remaining costs and debt for the redevelopment of the former Glenview Naval Air Station as The Glen. Once the TIF is retired, the Anixter expansion is expected to generate more than \$500,000 in additional property taxes over the next three years. Under the development

agreement with Glenview, the college is expected to pay \$1.9 million in property taxes that will be distributed to school districts 225 and 30, Glenview's park district and library, and other taxing jurisdictions after the TIF is retired.

There are about eight acres of land left for sale at the Prairie Glen Corporate Campus, which also includes as tenants Beltone, a developer of products for hearing impaired, and Mead Johnson, maker of formula and other infant nutrition products.



Request a parkway tree type by August 31

The Village manages an ongoing parkway tree planting program in order to help keep Glenview green. Each year, new trees are planted along public parkways and unhealthy or dead trees are removed. Through this program, residents may request a specific type of tree to be planted on the parkway in front of their property.

What can go in my recycling bin?

Paper: Ads, inserts, postcards, hard cover, soft cover, miscellaneous paper, mail, envelopes, copy paper, office paper, greeting cards, paper egg cartons, milk, juice and other beverage cartons, paper tubes, wrapping paper and cereal/food boxes. Place shredded paper into paper bags. Flatten all boxes.

Materials should be free of plastic bags and wrappers. No bath tissue, paper towels, photos, laminated paper or paper coated with food, wax or foil. Remove plastic bags and plastic wrappers. No cardboard with food residue or wax coating.

Plastic: Plastic containers numbered 1-5 and 7, including caps, rings, lids and labels.

Containers should be empty and free of excess liquids and food residue. No plastic bags, utensils, plates, toys, plant pots, garden hose or pools.

Metal: Aluminum, tin and steel food and spray cans, aluminum foil and foil trays. Caps, lids, pull tabs and labels and may remain on the containers. Place metal lids inside cans.

Containers should be empty and free of excess liquids and food residue. No fire extinguishers, propane or helium gas tanks, utensils, hangers, small appliances, batteries or auto parts.

Glass: Includes rinsed glass bottles and jars. Can put colors together. Please remove caps and lids. Labels do not need to be removed.

No light bulbs, mirrors, bakeware, ceramics, drinking glasses or window or auto glass.

VILLAGE BOARD AT WORK

The Village Board of Trustees met June 5 and 19. Items acted upon included:

- ◆ Authorized a Class A liquor license for McGovern's Public House, 1945 Willow Road, which permits the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises where food is served.
- ◆ Authorized a one-year contract with Palatine Oil Co. Inc. of Schaumburg to supply fuel for the Village's fleet for \$708,256. The purchase was made through a joint contract with the Northwest Municipal Conference's Suburban Purchasing Cooperative.
- ◆ Authorized an annual maintenance agreement with Motorola of Schaumburg to provide continuous, real time emergency-911 network monitoring, remote technical support and customer notification of detected alarms. The \$31,967 contract contained no increase from last year's.
- ◆ Authorized a \$92,250 agreement with James J. Benes & Associates Inc. of Lisle for traffic engineering services; a \$296,960 agreement with JAS Consultants LLC of Council Bluffs, Ia. for building plan review and inspection services; and a \$174,000 agreement with Rickman Contract Services Inc. of LaGrange for meter reading services.
- ◆ Authorized purchasing six Police Interceptors from Bredemann Ford of Glenview for a total \$169,824, to replace six squad cars in the fleet.
- ◆ Authorized a one-year, \$165,000 contract with American Underground Inc. of Glenview to view by television the structural condition of Village-owned sanitary and storm sewers and

to determine what repairs are needed. This service was bid jointly through the Municipal Partnering Initiative with five other municipalities.

- ◆ Authorized a one-year, \$340,900 contract with G&L Contractors Inc. of Skokie to haul debris and deliver aggregate material for various public works construction projects and maintenance activities.
- ◆ Approved a final site plan review to allow a building addition to the west side of North Branch Pizza & Burger Co., 4520 W. Lake Ave., formerly Gulliver's.
- ◆ Approved a conditional use to allow Wild Pita Mediterranean Grill, 1934-38 Waukegan Road, to operate as a dine-in and carry-out food and beverage establishment in a B-2 General Business District.
- ◆ Authorized an amendment to a contract with Schroeder & Schroeder Inc. of Skokie to add \$75,000 for additional sidewalk replacement work and \$104,000 for additional concrete minor area resurfacing on roadways.
- ◆ Received the 2011 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, which was issued with an unqualified "clean" audit opinion and no reportable findings or audit adjustments for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2011.
- ◆ Gave final approval for a conditional use to allow the Glenview Park District to construct a new clubhouse and paddle tennis sports courts at the National 9 Golf Course, 2800 W. Lake Ave.
- ◆ Approved purchasing an Arrow XT Heavy Duty Aerial Ladder Truck and ancillary equipment from pierce Manufac-

turing of Appleton, Wis. for \$1.06 million to place into front-line service within the Glenview Fire Department, and move the current truck into reserve status.

- ◆ Amended a redevelopment agreement with the E.J. Stern, owner of the Dry Cleaning Factory/Premier Fitness building at 1803-1805 and 1809-1837 Waukegan Road and the strip retail to the north in order to facilitate a fourth leg of the Chestnut/Waukegan intersection reconstruction in 2013. The amendment includes an additional property at 1727 Waukegan Road, the former Matty's Restaurant that Stern now owns in a Business Improvement District that will be established in order to help fund the cost of the project.
- ◆ Approved the final site plan for the Anixter Annex Building at 2651 Compass Road that calls for a two-story, 62,000-square-foot office building, parking lot modifications and site improvements on a 3.88-acre parcel connected to the existing Anixter corporate headquarters.
- ◆ Approved a conditional use to allow the operation of Puck Pros, a hockey training facility, a B-2 General Business District use, at 1820 Pickwick Avenue, in an I-2 Light Industrial District.
- ◆ Heard an update on Village pavement conditions prepared by IMS Infrastructure Management Services in order to analyze the next five-year pavement management plan.

Bugged by mosquitoes?


Abandoned outdoor swimming pools that contain untreated water are one of the most significant sources for breeding mosquitoes.

The mosquito abatement districts that serve Glenview want to know about unkempt swimming pools, especially if stagnant water has been standing for seven days or longer. Neglected swimming pools may produce thousands of mosquitoes, as can water standing in containers like tire casings, birdbaths and flower pots and clogged rain gutters.



Most of Glenview is included in the North Shore Mosquito Abatement District (www.nasmad.com, (847) 446-9434). The area south of Central Road and west of Washington Road is included in the Northwest Mosquito Abatement District (www.nwmadil.com, (847) 537-2306).

Residents are asked to report standing water problems to the districts, as well as sick or dead birds. The districts test mosquito pools as part of ongoing surveillance for both nuisance and culex mosquitoes and the presence of West Nile Virus.


