## Historic Landmark #3

Felix & Amy Junge Residence at 106 Park Drive



Built in 1922 by Felix and Amy (Doering) Junge, the Dutch Colonial building is located in The Park and is integral to The Park neighborhood's character. Felix Junge was a member of Glenview's first volunteer fire department and served in WWI as a medic in the Army Medical Corps, receiving a purple heart. The house was built on land from Felix's father, William Junge, who was one of the first residents in The Park. The William Junge family was one of the original founders of the Park. His wife, Malvina, assisted in delivering more than 50 newborns in the community in addition to their own 10 children, and the Junge family helped numerous families through the Great Depression with food and money contributions.

The Park is one of the country's first Planned Developments and Hugh Burnham, the Village's first President, was a resident of The Park. The Park and its residents significantly contributed to the

community's establishment, governance and early culture.

Dirk Pitcairn, Chairman and CEO of Pitcairn, an investment and tax service corporation for wealthy families, is the son of James Pitcairn. Felix and Amy Junge's son, Robert Junge, is the uncle of James Pitcairn, the former Chairman of Pitcairn and retired Director of PPG Industries. Pitcairn manages approximately \$1 billion in Pitcairn family assets of the heirs of John Pitcairn, the founder of Pittsburgh Plate and Glass (now PPG Industries), and another \$2 billion for 105 unrelated families.

Since the Junge family ownership (1922-1996) there have only been 3 other families who have owned the house; the Klein family (1966), the Anthony family (2000) and the Weber family (2005).

The subject property was official designated on June 20, 2010 via Village of Glenview Ordinance No. 5364.
